Helen Zughaib '81 was born in Beirut, Lebanon, living mostly in the Middle East and Europe before coming to the United States to study art at Syracuse University. Helen paints primarily in gouache and ink on board and canvas. More recently, she has worked with wood, shoes and cloth and mixed media installations. Her work has been widely exhibited in galleries and museums in the US, Europe and Lebanon. Her paintings are included in many private and public collections, including the White House.

Jave Yoshimoto was born in Japan to Chinese parents, immigrating to United States at a young age. Yoshimoto received his MFA in Painting at Syracuse University. Yoshimoto has been published on multiple publications and websites, received a letter of recognition from the United Nations, awarded the Joan Mitchell Foundation's Painters and Sculptors Grant in 2015 and exhibited works nationally and internationally. Yoshimoto is currently an assistant professor of arts and foundations coordinator at University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Deborah Roberts is a mixed media artist whose work challenges the notion of ideal beauty. Her work has been exhibited internationally across the USA and Europe. Roberts' work in New York includes: in the collections of Whitney Museum of American Art, Brooklyn Museum, The Studio Museum in Harlem, and The Frances Young Tang Teaching Museum and Art Gallery in Saratoga Springs. Roberts is the recipient of the Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant (2016) and Ginsburg-Klaus Award Fellowship (2014).

About the Syracuse University Art Museum

The Syracuse University Art Museum is the campus art museum of Syracuse University and is part of SU's Coalition of Museum and Art Centers. It strives to be a place of rigorous interdisciplinary research, creative thinking, and mindfulness, as well as an inclusive space that serves as a forum for a broad range of discussions that bring people together, uniting the wider community with students, faculty, and staff. The museum presents up to 20 exhibitions annually, scores of public programs, and an active schedule of class visits. It also manages the Palitz Gallery at the Syracuse University Lubin House in NYC where up to 6 exhibitions a year are presented. The museum's permanent collection of 45,000 artworks from 3500 BCE to present day includes important holdings from many areas of the world. Over the past 35 years, the museum has shared much of its art collection with peer institutions across the country through its traveling exhibition program.

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
